- 1. What comes to mind when you hear the phrase "Love your neighbor as yourself"? Does that seem easy or hard? Why?
- 2. Read Luke 10:25-37 and review the outline. What stands out to you and why?
- 3. The Expert in the Law asks Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?" Why do you think he asked this? What does this reveal about his mindset?
- 4. What are some ways we might try to *limit* our responsibility to love others, like the expert in the law did?
- 5. Why do you think Jesus answers the man's question with a question of His own in vs. 26? Why not give him a direct answer right away?
- 6. In the parable, the priest and the Levite saw the wounded man but chose to pass by (Luke 10:31-32). What are some possible reasons they didn't stop to help?
- 7. The Samaritan responded differently (Luke 10:33-35). What stands out to you about his actions, and what do they reveal about what it means to "be a neighbor"?
- 8. What are some practical ways we can shift from "Who is my neighbor?" to "How can I be a neighbor?" in our workplaces, communities, and even our families? Once you figure it out, you can assume that Jesus would say the last 4 words of vs. 37 to you.
